CEO LETTER

As we enter 2023, the Marsha P. Johnson Institute and I are looking back at all of our successes from last year and what challenges we faced that will inform our growth into this new year: our Renaissance Year.

I founded the Marsha P. Johnson Institute (MPJI) after realizing that I was very vulnerable in the world as a Black trans woman and after being arrested in 2014. I spent several days in jail and wanted to do something different to change the experience I was having as a woman and help improve the experiences that Black trans people were having. Additionally, there was and is an epidemic of murders of BLACK trans women that is vastly underreported. The violent and preventable nature of these deaths directly connects to the exclusion of BLACK trans people from social justice issues, namely racial, gender, and reproductive justice, as well as gun violence reform.

As a BLACK trans woman who grew up in midwestern America, I have lived through many of the key issues MPJI is working to eradicate: employment discrimination, physical violence, incarceration, survival sex work, homelessness. These were my realities, and I know they are shared by many. I founded this organization to center these needs and lived experiences.

MPJI was established to protect and defend the human rights of BLACK transgender people. Our communities experience disproportionate rates of systemic violence and economic discrimination, and BLACK trans women are among the most vulnerable populations in our country. MPJI seeks to eradicate the systemic, community, and physical violence that silences our community from actualizing freedom, joy, and safety. Additionally, I also did not see stories of joy, love, and resistance about BLACK trans people, and I wanted to show people that we live fulfilling, joyful lives with friends, families, and loved ones.

Our work involves advocating, offering fellowship opportunities, creating coalitions, capacity building for our community, and establishing trans-centered digital and on-the-ground campaigns. It is my dream to use MPJI to create national resources for the BLACK trans community and to start a new conversation—to enact a true culture change—so that we may all be free.

Some of our key programs and resources:

The Coalition to Protect BLACK Trans Women: This coalition works with partner organizations

to protect BLACK trans women by bringing about solutions that actualize safety within local communities

MPJI Resource Map: We provide culturally competent resources for basic necessities like housing, food security, legal and financial support, COVID-19 relief, health/wellness, employment, social support, and more.

Starship Artist Fellowship (SAF): SAF was created to empower BLACK, TGNC creatives and provide resources to ease the burden of transphobia experienced in artistic spaces.

We are so proud to share these accomplishments with you as MPJI stands strong in a long line of fierce BLACK trans trailblazers, and as the ONLY national non-profit focused on protecting and defending the human rights of BLACK trans people, who are egregiously always under attack.

We've got big plans for our community. I am so honored to support those plans moving forward. The team at MPJI and I hope you will support us as we continue to dream, build, and plan for our community.

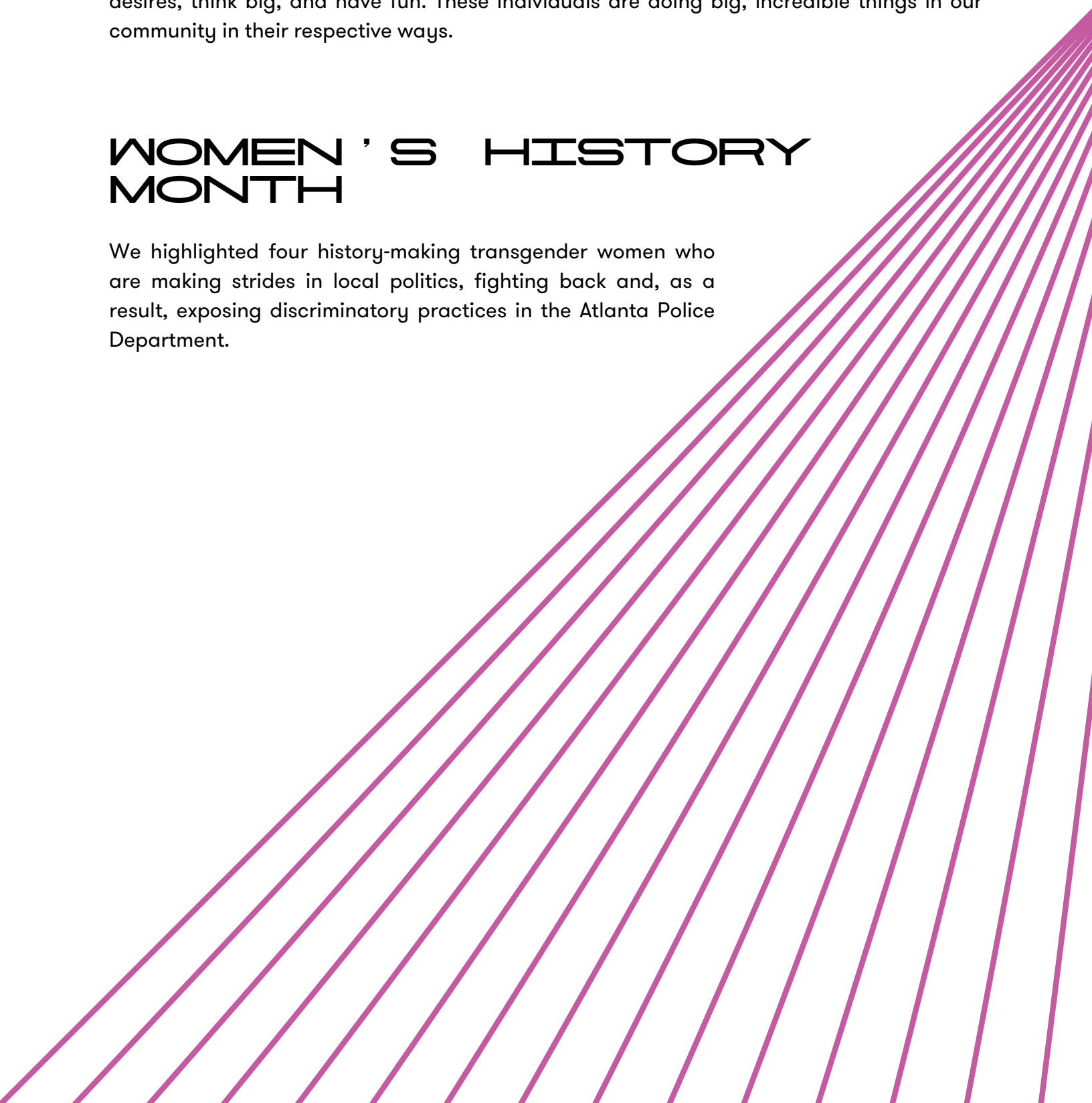
Pride did not start out with the waving of rainbow flags and parades. Pride was, and is, a display of resistance! At the start of 2022, more than 300 bills were proposed attacking the trans community and LGBTQ+ community as a whole. In a matter of months, those coordinated attacks on trans lives swept across the nation. In the spirit of our namesake, for Pride Month we explored the modern-day movement with a deeper lens in our campaign, "Radical Pride: The Politics of UN(REST)." Let Pride month be a reminder that there is still work to do!

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

For our BHM Honor series, we honored several brilliant BLACK transgender people who embody MPJI's value of passion. Passion fuels how we celebrate our successes, demonstrate our rage, encourage joy for ourselves, and with each other, explore our desires, think big, and have fun. These individuals are doing big, incredible things in our community in their respective ways.

WOMEN ' S HISTORY MONTH

We highlighted four history-making transgender women who are making strides in local politics, fighting back and, as a result, exposing discriminatory practices in the Atlanta Police Department.



BLACK AUGUST

This annual commemoration is a call to remember BLACK freedom fighters and political prisoners while highlighting BLACK resistance against racial oppression. We highlighted four trans and nonbinary activists making big impacts in the community.

LCBTQ + HISTORY MONTH

During this month, we highlighted individuals who have influenced pop culture in the areas of fashion, music, television, and literature - from those you probably know, to those who have not been given enough flowers.

TRANSGENDER AWARENESS WEEK

In November 2022, we announced the creation of the Coalition to End Violence Against BLACK Trans Women. The coalition is made up of organizations working collectively to analyze the problem, create advocacy tools, resources, and creative solutions to increase the safety of BLACK trans women & trans femmes.

TRANSGENDER DAY OF REMEMBRANCE

We celebrate BLACK trans people, our lives and full experience. Our rallying cry will always be that we figure out how to honor people while they are still here by providing them with the things they need, resources that would minimize the likelihood of them being in dangerous situation. In 2022, we created a digital vigil to remember the lives of our BLACK TGNC siblings who are gone too soon due to acts of violence.

TRANSGENDER DAY OF VISIBILITY

Founder and CEO of MPJI, Elle Moxley, was joined by Cecilia Gentili, founder of Trans Equity Consulting, to discuss the good and bad of increased visibility, how to be in solidarity with the community, and how Marsha P. Johnson influenced their lives.

MPJI PROGRAMS OVERVIEW



THE STARSHIP ARTIST FELLOWSHIP

Marsha “Pay it no mind” Johnson existed and expressed boldly as a living art form. From being a model for an Andy Warhol campaign to being a part of the “Hot Peaches” performance troupe, Marsha is indeed a conduit for creativity. The purpose of MPJI’s artist fellowships is to empower BLACK trans creatives and provide resources that will ease the burden of transphobia experienced in artistic spaces.

The Starship Artist Fellowship is a six-month fellowship where five emerging artists will receive a monthly stipend, tools, and resources necessary to further their craft as well as be paired with a mentor to learn both technical and developing skills that support their medium of choice. With the support of their mentor, artists will work to create pieces that reflect their vision for a BLACK Trans Renaissance to be shared at a final showcase event in NYC!

THE COALITION TO END VIOLENCE AGAINST BLACK TRANSGENDER WOMEN

The Marsha P. Johnson Institute was initially founded as a response to the murders of BLACK trans women and remains deeply committed to working to stop the epidemic of violence. From unjust local and national laws that strip trans people of humanity to the growing number of BLACK trans women and femmes whose lives are lost to structural, institutional, and interpersonal violence, we seek to end all systems of violence against BLACK trans women and trans femmes by abolishing the circumstances that invoke these tragedies.

This coalition works collectively to analyze the problem and create advocacy tools, resources, and creative solutions to increase the safety of BLACK trans women & trans femmes. As with all the work MPJI embarked on, this project is rooted in abolitionist values with a firm rejection of any solutions that increase policing, surveillance, or incarceration.





MPJI RESOURCE MAP

What started as an idea in 2021 became a reality in 2022 with the launch of the MPJI Resource Map. After a year of dedicated research and development, we identified resources for the TGNC community in all 50 states! The MPJI Resource Map is a national list to help our TGNC siblings find local resources from employment and legal care to TGNC-friendly physicians and TGNC-owned businesses. We will continue to keep this resource updated for the community to access for years to come.

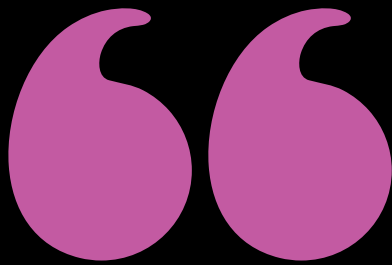
